Persecution of Christians

The pope's missionary intention for September
The Muslim sect (or group as some devout Muslims
would prefer to call them) started threatening
Christians living in the Northern part of Nigeria since
2008. The country is largely divided among Muslim

north and Christian south. In 2011, this threat took a turn for the worse with the Christmas-day bombing of worshippers of St. Theresa's Catholic Church, Madalla, near Abuja, the capital, resulting in the death of over 45 worshippers. This has been followed by several other bombings of Christian places of worship with the Catholic Church bearing the brunt of the attacks. It has been reported that over 1000 persons have lost their lives since this persecution started.

There has been a lot of confusion about how Christians should react in the face of these unprovoked and unwarranted attacks with some Pastors calling for reprisal attacks. The Catholic Bishops' Conference of Nigeria in particular has called for restraint and prayers, saying the Lord has promised to do our battle and that vengeance is His (cf: Rom 12;19).

What has been amazing is that despite the fact that a lot of people, mostly women and children, have been evacuated from the North, there has been no significant damping of the enthusiasm of the remaining Christian worshippers in the affected areas and Christians in the South still tolerate Northerners (who are mostly Muslims) and allow them go about their businesses with unfettered access. The threat of another bombing at Easter (which unfortunately was actualized) did not prevent most parishes from carrying on with their Holy Week activities and Easter celebrations.

Most Christians have seen these attacks, especially with the Lenten season coming in, as their cross and trial to exercise their faith and demonstrate their trust in God. Most people have come to believe that God has a purpose for allowing this evil that is been perpetrated in the country and all things still work for good for those who love Him (Rom 8:28). They somehow believe that those who gave their lives are like the proverbial wheat grain which dies so that it would yield a bountiful harvest – that may be the most likely way God wants the Christian faith to spread in Northern Nigeria.
