# The Holy Father's missionary prayer intentions for December

In this holy season of Advent, we do not simply look back to the first Christmas, but look to our world today and examine where the Savior Jesus Christ wants to come to dwell with us now. Jesus Christ, born in Bethlehem 2000 years ago, is eager to be born anew in our world. In the words of the medieval mystic Meister Eckhart, "If Christ were born 1000 times in Bethlehem, but not in you, it would all be in vain."

Jesus Christ comes as a gift, but also as a challenge. Thus we must look at ourselves, and reflect on where the peace, joy, light and love of Jesus Christ could and should be more present in our personal lives and in our relationships. Pope Benedict reminded us of this last Advent when he said: "As we prepare for Christmas, it is important that we find time for self contemplation and carry out an honest assessment of our lives."

Yet the full meaning of Christmas does not stop with us but goes one step farther. We must look beyond ourselves. In accord with the Holy Father's intention for the month, we do our part to "prepare humanity for the Savior's coming."

Like the mighty Advent figure John the Baptist, by our prayers, good example, and Christ-like actions, we point the way to Jesus so that indeed he can be born afresh in our world. Again, with Meister Eckhart: "What help is it to me that the Father gives birth to his son, unless I too give birth to him!" The United States Bishops in a pastoral letter on Mary some years ago wrote: "All who truly follow Christ, become like mothers of Christ, for by their faith they bring him to birth in others."

Following the example of Mary we try to live the prayer of St. Francis of Assisi and become instruments of God's peace, joy, and love in our world. If we do our part in preparing humanity for the Savior's coming, then indeed it will be a more joyous and peace-filled Christmas celebration and a Blessed New Year. Rev. Peter Schineller, S.J.
